Performers from all over the northwest as well as local talent present many styles of improv comedy ranging from short form games to one act improvised plays, musicals, and competitive improv.

How The Upfront Theatre can work with Bellingham Public Schools

The Upfront Theatre offers personalized, improv-based workshops for companies and groups; custom designed to focus on specific needs. Working with youth in the Bellingham Public School District could be a very good influence.

The Upfront Theatre could create a district-wide program that involves positive performances at assemblies that get children involved. The Upfront Theatre could also provide improv classes for specific school classes or programs; for example, an improv class for the drama departments at each school could be very influential and a great learning tool for students.

Finally, there's always the option of improv classes for administration and teachers that would be a good teambuilding activity and help with communication skills.

In addition, at least one Bellingham public school (Fairhaven Middle School) has its own improv group that could be worked with on a creative project.



Bellingham Public School budget for 2009-2010 school year

The nation, state and local community are facing many financial and service-related challenges as a result of the significant downturn in the national and international economies. Since the operating budget of the school district is fiscally dependent upon the state for the majority of the revenue it receives, any negative change in the amount of revenue the state receives usually means that the school district's revenue will be less.

Bellingham must reduce its operating budget for the 2009-10 school year due to a combination of rising costs, years of inadequate state funding, at least a \$9 billion state budget deficit, and rigid state finance law that allows little flexibility in determining how to fund students' greatest needs



About 84 percent of the school district's budget is spent on people and personnel-related costs and 16 percent on nonemployee costs such as fuel, utilities, supplies, insurance, etc. Most resources are spent on teaching and learning -72 percent of the total operating budget, which is above the state average.

Bellingham School District currently only spends 16 percent on instructional and related support services, which is below the state average. This would be where funding came from to support a district-wide program from The Upfront Theatre.

Currently existing programs in the Bellingham School District

Bellingham public schools currently have programs established in the arts and drama, but these vary according to school. Fairhaven Middle School actively participates in the school Chalk Art Festival, the Bellingham Arts Council event, and the Bellingham Children's Art Walk; they also have an improv club with members that perform at events like school assemblies and before parent groups.

Practices the can be learned from The Upfront Theatre

Improv classes are a good resource to teach the following to all audiences:

- Creativity
- Teamwork
- Communication
- Confidence
- Adaptability
- Innovation

Through improv exercises and games, The Upfront Theatre lets individuals explore their creativity and build confidence, while teaching teambuilding and communication skills.

The Upfront Theatre already has classes available specifically for middle school and high school students. The course is designed to excite and inspire students, covering the fundamentals and introducing them to the wonderful world of improvisation. These courses could have a very positive influence if taught at a district-wide level.

In addition, The Upfront Theatre offers many business-focused classes. For example, the BizProv workshops include an hour of fun, focused, specific improv games and exercises directly related to increasing success in business. The workshops are centered around using the principles and practices of improv to increase communication skills, teamwork, creativity, confidence, adaptability, spontaneity and the ability to "think on your feet."

Classes that focus on teachers and administration can improve teamwork and communication skills, as well as give ideas to teachers for a classroom setting.
